JULIAN ARTHUR ("J.A.") PEVERILL

1889 - 1952

Julian Arthur Peverill was usually referred to as "J.A," and some thought his name was in fact Jay. The name was derived from Sir Walter Scott's novel Peverill Of The Peak. He was a bright, dapper, charismatic individual. He entered the automobile business as a teenager and, while his education ended at the eighth grade, he was very articulate, and his written correspondence might easily have been that of a college graduate. He was 15 years older than my father, and many assumed they were father and son which, in some respects, they seemed to resemble.

Julian served as president of the Des Moines and Iowa automobile dealers associations as well as a director of the National Automobile Dealers Association (NADA). He served as a board member of Central National Bank and President of the Des Moines Club during those organizations' difficult depression years. He was a past president of the Greater Des Moines Committee.

J.A. was an early occupant and long-term resident of Clear Lake's Outing Club. He was a boating and yachting enthusiast; his Chris Craft boats were a Clear Lake legend. During WWII, he lent his yachts to the Coast Guard. He often remarked that if he lost his wealth, he would like to become a "bartender on an ocean going ship."

Gentlemen -

It seems to me like a long time ago that I started in the motor car business, but I did start in Waterloo, Icwa in the spring of 1906 under the name of the Glide Automobile Company, my first contract having been written with the A. Y. Bartholomew Company of Peoria, Illinois, the then manufacturer of the Glide automobile.

Sometime during the year 1900 the name of the firm was changed to the Peverill Motor Sales Company, and we subsequently became the third largest Hegal Distributor in the United States, our contract with the Regal Motor Car Company having been signed to cover approximately two thirds of the state of Iowa.

During the year of 1910 we became the Materloo, Iowa Dodge Dealer covering approximately eight counties surrounding that area, and during the year 1913 we signed up as a Mudeon Dealer covering the northeastern eighteen counties of Iowa, subsequently signing associate dealers in each of the eighteen counties.

Immediately following the close of World War I the writer became associated as a partner in the Hudson-Jones Automobile Company, Iowa Hudson Distributorship, and in turn sold the Peverill Meter Sales Company to the Hudson-Jones Automobile Company to be operated as a branch, the Dodge dealership contract having bean separated from the operation and operated as a partnership until the year 1922 when the Waterloo Branch overation was discontinued.

The writer continued to operate as the General Hanager of the Hudson-Jones Automobile Company until the year 1924 at which time Mr. G. W. Jones, then President of the Company, retired from the automobile business.

The Hudson-Jones Automobile Company has continued exclusively with Hudson with the writer continuing as President until as of this writing.

The writer who was born on October 3, 1889 entertains the idea that he is eligible as the oldest automobile merchant having remained continuously in the motor car business longer than any other
