### Evaluation # 28297

## Summarize your overall assessment of the experience and the effect you anticipate it will have on your teaching and scholarship.

The learning experience at Amherst College studying documents concerning punishment was a rich and engaging month that will add tenfold to my teaching and intellectual life. I am deeply grateful for this opportunity. Professor Sarat gave us a new lens to look at how we teach our students. I will benefit from this seminar when I return to the classroom in the Fall. I have a new vocabulary and language to talk about punishment. For example, in teaching Homer's the Odyssey, I can use the lens of punishment to go deeper into the text. Or, when I am doing my scholarship, I will remember our discussions and the notes that I took to go even further in my learning.

The director, Professor Austin Sarat, is a seasoned NEH director. He has years of experience working with teachers and I felt right away he was happy to host us. Aimee Keddy was invaluable in providing pedagogical tools to help us in the classroom. The texts and ideas we discussed in this seminar were challenging but we were given plenty of tools, tips, and tricks to bring it back to our classrooms. I loved the open discussion style seminar and I appreciated how Professor Sarat challended us to think analytically and to "argue against ourselves."

# Summarize your overall assessment of the experience and the effect you anticipate it will have on your teaching and scholarship.

This experience has shifted my approach in my teaching. Austin's method of using readings and scenario-based and question-based discussions allows students to question what had been presumed to be common definitions for key terms in the course. It enabled us to better explore the complexity of the issues by showing how difficult it could be to agree upon a definition. In doing so, Austin also expertly demonstrated the importance of investing time in defining the key terms of a course.

# Evaluate specific aspects of the program, such as the director, visiting faculty (if any), colleagues, topics, organization, discussions, and activities.

Austin is an incredible professor whose knowledge of the course content and experience in teaching it is unparalleled. His facilitating of group discussion and his ability to create hypothetical situations to highlight complexity are two of his greatest strengths as a teacher.

The discussions in the seminar delved into unexpected depths and challenged the participants to think more critically and deeply than I had anticipated. It led to great conversations both within and after the seminar meetings.

The group presentations need more detailed explanations of expectations and instructions; it proved frustratingly challenging for many of us.

Evaluate the host institution particularly with respect to hospitality, housing arrangements, the suitability of library facilities, and computer facilities.

The host institution was wonderful. The buildings that we needed to access were all very close to the dorm in which we lived. The dining hall was a very cost-effective option for meals. The housing arrangements were good, especially with the AC. The only reservation is the cleanliness of the floors in the common spaces (it was unclear whether or not we were responsible for sweeping and vacuuming the floors).

The library staff were wonderful and incredibly helpful.

### Do you have any suggestions for improvements?

Reconsider how the group projects are structured. Otherwise, this is a very well-structured course.

David Campbell at University of Notre Dame could lead a very interesting seminar on the factors that impact the civic life of the country, especially for the younger generation, or the intersection of religion and politics.

Director: Professor Sarat brings his insight, depth of knowledge, humanity and humor to the table while simultaneously creating a space for the seminar participants to explore our own ideas, grapple with our understanding, and pose questions in ways that push our thinking and support our inquiry. He is an exceptional thinker and teacher.

Colleagues: I have enjoyed connecting with and learning from the people around the seminar table. I especially like the divergent beliefs and ideologies that are represented. I wish there was more racial/ethnic diversity. I understand that there is a shortage of teachers of color in our country for multiple reasons. I believe the voices of teachers of color are essential in the process of constructing knowledge and hope that more is done on the part of NEH to recruit and encourage more diverse voices. I do not doubt that you are trying. I wonder how you might try differently.

Topics: Punishment, justice, mercy, cruelty, rights and responsibility...there is so much to read, consider, synthesize and discern. I love the focus of this seminar. It is forever timely. And today, it feels urgent.

I feel immersed in the punishment aspect, am excited by the politics part but don't quite see the "culture" connection in our work so far.

Discussions: Professor Sarat is masterful at facilitating discussion. The readings are so well curated. It is day 2 of week 4 and I feel like I am just getting my stride. The connections between the texts and the layers of ideas and perspectives are becoming more and more clear to me. I have so enjoyed the discussions and I have wished that we could spend more time on each reading. There is always so much more to say about each reading, but our conversations feel necessarily rushed. I would like more time to hear from colleagues about how they approached and interpreted the texts. I also realize that we could do whole seminar on many of the individual texts, topics and ideas that we talk about. I am sad this is ending soon. I need to find a way to continue my thinking beyond these four weeks in a systematic and disciplined way. Yet, I know this will be difficult. The work load is both challenging and manageable. I know my thinking would be more developed and clear if we also had writing assignments to go with the readings. But we don't have time for that so don't add it!!!

Organization: Megan Estes has been wonderfully organized and helpful regarding the logistical aspects of this experience. Everyone connected to this experience has been responsive, available and accommodating. What have we done to deserve this? (Teachers are not always used to being treated/respected this way.) I have also appreciated the time that we have to read on our own, connect with others at our discretion, and explore the area-alone and with new friends. I am working hard, learning, creating and having fun at the same time. These are the ingredients I need for a perfect summer.

I am living off campus nearby because I have my dog. I do spend a lot of time at Drew House, Valentine Hall and the library. I think everything has been wonderful. Can it be too wonderful? # Summarize your overall assessment of the experience and the effect you anticipate it will have on your teaching and scholarship.

This has been a very positive experience for me, on both a personal and professional level. The experience enabled me to empathize more with the needs and struggles of my students--especially the challenges of reading unfamiliar and complex texts. It required me to stretch my mind and to continue in my quest to become a better listener and colleague. As an educator, I was introduced to new and refined pedagogical techniques, as well as to a number of texts and resources that will support the teaching and exploration of related themes we often find in literature, including revenge, punishment, justice, and democracy.

Finally, returning to the experience of becoming a student again, the seminars were helpful in reminding me of how we teachers can make students feel, regardless of our intent. While I don't think there was an ill-intent or malice, individual participants could be made to feel more valued for their contributions. Some participants appeared to be given a great deal of time to elaborate, while others not so. Some participants appeared to always say something that Dr. Sarat found profound or "fabulous," while his response to others was typically less enthusiastic. One participant in particular called out incessantly, paraphrasing Dr. Sarat's comments before we could digest them, muttering as others spoke, calling out responses, and pontificating for what seemed excessive lengths of time. Others weren't given such free range. In any classroom, this perceived inconsistency can breed hostility, make students divest from participation, and promote feelings of doubt. Again, the issue is not intent, as it is extremely unlikely that Dr. Sarat would aspire to make some feel more valued than others. But it was nonetheless important to be aware of what we communicate by our interactions, and what students may perceive. In the end though, Dr. Sarat is a master scholar and as committed an educator as there is.

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Evaluate specific aspects of the program, such as the director, visiting faculty (if any), colleagues, topics, organization, discussions, and activities.

Most evident about Dr. Sarat is his exceptionally broad and deep knowledge and command of jurisprudence for sure, but also of the Humanities as well. This guided his work with us, no doubt, but it also served to reinforce the importance of content knowledge as educators ourselves. Seminar participants were respectful of opposing viewpoints. As true with any residential environment, cliques are bound to form but these never appeared to interfere with our work or the larger environment. Participants were welcomed to be as active with colleagues as they wished, or to keep more to themselves.

To sure, working with adults (educators who were eager and invested enough in the content to apply for this opportunity) is a whole different animal than teaching students in our schools. Nonetheless, there are some pedagogical things that can apply to any learning environment, such the power Dr. Sarat beginning seminars by posing a "problem" which will require us to ponder our values and apply content from our readings.

Amherst was very welcoming in all respects. Participants who researched staying off-campus to save a few bucks, felt the quality and convenience of residing in Drew House made the choice very worthwhile. Participants appear to feel Drew was very well (and stealthily!) maintained, and provided easy access to the dining hall, gym, library, seminar room, and local shops and restaurants.

### Do you have any suggestions for improvements?

The syllabus was so ambitious and lengthy that it was continually revised, with a number of pieces eliminated. Many key pieces never got the time and attention they apparently deserved. It might be best to pare down the readings to the essential, or give selected participants the syllabus in advance. We received a list of books to read in advance, but little time was spent discussing them.

## Summarize your overall assessment of the experience and the effect you anticipate it will have on your teaching and scholarship.

I cannot say enough about how rewarding an experience this seminar has been. It has greatly expanded my own critical thinking, provided me new lenses with which to create lessons for my students, and allowed me an opportunity to re-think my pedagogy to consider what I am taking for granted and what needs additional clarification. All of these, of course, strengthen my ability to craft and share lessons with my students. Finally, as a significant feature in my courses is how authoritarian states gain and maintain power, my exposure to this rich exploration of how and why societies' punish, will greatly enrich my instruction (and hopefully my students' understanding).

The Director of the program is beyond compare. The breadth of his knowledge and ability to share it with the participants is incredible. He is genuinely interested in our views and ensuring that the program, in all its component parts, provided us all with a great experience. His willingness to share his time out of class to answer any and all questions we had was also wonderful. Amie, who ran the break-out sessions, was a wonderful facilitator for our group. She too was knowledgeable and helpful and did all she could to help us organize the materials in a way that we could utilize in our schools. Moreover, I greatly appreciated the variety of materials provided. It was so enriching to come at the subject through fiction, non-fiction, film and other modes.

I loved the manner in which Austin ran the class. The use of hypotheticals and a Socratic approach to flesh out the meaning of the different terms, concepts, and materials expanded all of our thinking. I am also grateful that he made sure that everyone participated and that all ideas were explored. As a result, I was fully engaged during every moment of class and I was able to approach the reading with genuine interest and excitement. As was noted in our class, it is a spider web where all of our discussions connected and our understanding spiraled outward.

## Summarize your overall assessment of the experience and the effect you anticipate it will have on your teaching and scholarship.

Very much like the life-changing seminar I was a part of in the summer of 2003 (Arabic Novel in Translation), this seminar has challenged, enlightened, and informed me of numerous issues important to my role as a citizen and my role as a teacher. While I teach English, which may seem far removed from the content of this seminar, the important ethical, legal and moral questions Professor Sarat has posed throughout our discussions are valuable to me. The fundamental questions regarding punishment, justice, mercy, retribution, etc., are thematic issues that emerge again and again in the literature I teach as well as discussions I have with students. I cannot specifically point to information I plan to use directly in a curricular unit, but what I CAN be certain of is I will be able to facilitate discussions of these themes with students with far greater confidence. Intellectually speaking, I feel as though I have been challenged in my thinking and, in fact, have had an intensive taste of what it means to ask mportant moral and ethical questions. I have also gained even more appreciation for fundamental tools of our justice system which also includes being able to ask better questions of it.

## Evaluate specific aspects of the program, such as the director, visiting faculty (if any), colleagues, topics, organization, discussions, and activities.

Professor Austin Sarat is not only an exemplary teacher and scholar, but also an admirable, compassionate human being. He gives himself completely to his students and I believe I have been a honored witness of what great teachers do. If I could duplicate HALF of what I learned pedagogically in this seminar, I would be 100% of a better teacher. The reading was intense, but, for me, not because of length but because of the content. Film and literature, of course, are familiar types of texts for me. Reading Supreme Court decisions and dissents is not my typical fare, but I feel as though another door has been opened with this exposure (what that door will lead to, I haven't figured out). The interdisciplinary nature of this seminar attracted me to it in the first place, and the content did not disappoint. Because Amherst College and Austin have conducted the seminar a few times prior to this, organization and logistics seemed as good as they could ever be. Finally, as some previous experiences have shown me, my colleagues this NEH Seminar attracted could not have been a kinder, respectful, and passionately curious group. Thoughtful people with different ways of thinking, with different teaching experiences, from different types of schools--every teacher should expose themselves to such diversity each summer.

Any reason I had, as a commuter, to rely on Amherst College for direction was met with immediate response. Megan Estes, in particular, was superb as our AC "contact." I did not reside at Amherst, but obtaining a parking pass was no trouble (thanks to Megan) and having a key fob to allow me in the common area of the residence hall were all I needed. Since this Seminar falls under AC's aegis of Summer Programs, there were professional lawn SIGNS, as I approached Amherst campus, directing me to where I needed to go the first day. I have NEVER seen that at any other institution at which I had a NEH Seminar or Institute. That points to the seminar's visibility and its value to Amherst. Between the commute, the reading, and the seminar time, I could not avail myself of the Library services. My work-issued computer could not hook up with the Amherst server, so I had problems there, but that is not on Amherst. It's the way my school sets up our laptops.

### Do you have any suggestions for improvements?

I would like to say, make it FIVE weeks, but I imagine NEH has commitments to keeping these seminars at 2-4 weeks in order to attract applicants. My only request, and this is personal, would be to hold the seminar earlier in the day.

Contemporary Literature from the Middle East (or some variation); The Essay Tradition in American/Western Literature. I have noticed a reduction in the number of seminars with a literature focus. Poetry/Arts and History (or some variation, consider Tracy K. Smith--former Poet Laureate--now at Princeton). At the moment, I cannot think of others.

## Summarize your overall assessment of the experience and the effect you anticipate it will have on your teaching and scholarship.

I was searching for a philosophical underpinning for my civic unit on the opioid crisis in Southern Ohio since it is glaringly obvious that there is an interplay between punishment politics and crime. Prof Sarat

provided so many structural supports to anchor our study. As a result, my students and I will ask different questions and look for academic support that should extend well beyond the opioid crisis to general discussions about the purposes of government and the role punishment plays paying special attention to the inclusion and application of the 8th Amendment to the Constitution.

## Evaluate specific aspects of the program, such as the director, visiting faculty (if any), colleagues, topics, organization, discussions, and activities.

There were 2 aspects of the program that were especially unique and appealing. Firstly the structure of the readings that daily connected literature or film to scholarly articles to Supreme Court cases was outstanding! Trained in history and government adding the extra layers of literature and film was fantastic because it really explained a part of the story on the culture and perspectives of society that explains the rest of the story in a far more humanizing way than I really exposed to in college and that would help connect students. Since I co-teach AP government with an AP Language teacher this may a new and natural avenue to connect our content.

Secondly, his entire approach to teaching is a refreshing reversal of what our high school institutions seem to really prize right -- knowing the right answer. So much of my experience as a teacher has sacrificed the beauty of the open-ended question and a hunger for true learning into a competition for achieving test results. Of course 'high stakes' tests, computer graded only evaluate at the knowledge level where answers are right or wrong. Rarely do we have the opportunity to ask more of ourselves as teachers than to get our students to regurgitate the 'right answer.' Professor Sarat reminds us that perhaps that is a kind of indoctrination that is so harmful to protecting our democracy (ir)regardless of what we tell ourselves. Sadly I must admit that I am part of this system and have become so caught up in testing that I rarely even bothered to question it. Although the students and I have come to this opioid problem together only looking for answers, maybe this has saved me. So coincidentally the opioid crisis led me to the Professor, and he has modelled and prodded and finally simply explained that to tell students the answers to questions is indoctrination, but to help students learn how to questions and learn and creatively explore -- that is learning. So now I need to try and alter my intentions again. Thank you!

His usage of formative assessment to drive the day's seminar and the seminar in length was instructional for me. As a new teacher, I realized that closure at the end of lesson doesn't add up to learning. In fact, true learning happens when the conversations, thoughts, and ideas linger. I found that my NEH colleagues and I continued the conversations we started in the seminar during lunch, dinner, happy hour! I think I might be more comfortable with not having closure at the end of a lesson more now than when I started this seminar. The seminar also piqued my interest in this subject of the justice system as the texts we read were so perfectly curated. Now at the end of the seminar, I understand the intentionality behind the syllabus' construction. Personally, Austin really pushed my thinking, but at the same time boosted my confidence so much as both a learner and teacher that it blows all the PDs I have attended in the last three years of my teaching career out of the water! Austin taught me not only a humanity subject that interests me academically, but he also has shown me what good teaching looks like (even better than some of the pedagogical profs. I had in grad school!).

Instead, the frameworks, ideas and questions from this seminar will help me to reconceptualize how and why I teach certain pieces of my curriculum and how I deal with complex, controversial topics in my classroom.

Austin Sarat is an entertaining, insightful, and very knowledgeable seminar leader. He does a great job of introducing interesting concepts and perspectives, and also prompts us to question and defend our own opinions. He has also put together a very thoughtful, carefully planned reading list, which is

crafted to build our understanding over time and allow us to put different perspectives in conversation with one another.

My colleagues in the program have been, overall, great. One thing I think NEH needs to work on, based on this experience, is bringing in greater racial diversity. 15 out of the 16 participants in my seminar are white, and it is important to make sure these opportunities are actively made available to all teachers. It is also important that diverse perspectives are included in our conversations.

This was all great-- the housing was comfortable (as far as dorm beds can be comfortable), Drew House is beautiful and has everything we need, and I appreciate that we were the only group in the house.

The only complaint I have is that the room in which we met for our seminar did not comfortably accommodate our entire group-- not everyone fits around the table, so there are always one or two people set off from the table. This is a problem for a seminar in which we all need to be able to see and respond to each other, as well as have table space for reading and writing materials. Pretty room, and cozy, but not functional if we can't all sit in a circle, with no one boxed out, and see each other.

This seminar is more theory-based than reality-based. For me this could be frustrating at times-ultimately it's still worthwhile, and it's certainly interesting and fun to kick these ideas around, but at times I was frustrated that the conversation took place in a philosophical, academic space that wasn't always tied, via facts, to real life impacts that happen to real people.

Simply being back in student-mode is such a re-invigorating and exciting experience. It reminds me how important good questions and good discussions are to learning. It inspired me to get better at leading discussions and I am going to take what I saw Austin doing in our discussions (withholding his own ideas, listening to all sides, further questioning, giving credit to ideas he disagreed with) back into my classroom's discussions. The way we discussed difficult topics through universal concepts of justice, cruelty, mercy, pain, etc. by combining our personal ideas with experts' ideas is a method of study that I would also like to bring back to my classroom because it allows students to feel like their ideas matter. I will also use the knowledge I gained from this seminar to inform my own understanding of the death penalty when I read about it in the news and discuss it with colleagues.

Director was excellent at engaging participants in meaningful questioning without inserting his own opinions which would stifle the conversation. He was also very friendly, helpful, hilarious, and his interest and passion for the subject was contagious. His one fault is that he occasionally does not answer students' questions satisfactorily and seems to dismiss them at times if they don't fit with his direction for the discussion. Colleagues were also all intelligent, curious, and co-operative. Discussions were incredibly engaging and there was full participation by everyone. Group work was the only real activity: they were as well executed as they could be, although I personally was not satisfied with the way my groups chose to carry through the task.

Austin set a great tone for the seminar from the beginning. I appreciated how he made a point of privileging collegiality and equity, both by cold calling each person at the start of each session and by stressing how intellect isn't everything (saying, for example, that there are more important things in life than seeming smart - which was welcome encouragement in such a capable cohort). I laughed harder and thought harder than I have in a long, long time.

Each reading built on the ideas of every other. I particularly appreciated the literary sources (Job, Billy Budd, and Beloved) and films as they complemented and expanded upon the legal and philosophical import of court cases and judicial precedent. I wasn't totally sure what I thought about capital punishment when I came into the course, and now I feel even less sure than I did and have questions I hadn't even thought to consider before; that's perhaps the greatest compliment I could give to an intellectual experience. The readings came from many different perspectives and Austin helped us put them in conversation with one another. I will always remember his dictum: "empathy before critique" and plan to use this with my own students back in the classroom.

I felt that the class was not altogether open-minded to different points of view. I often saw that people would judge and discredit other people personally based on their thoughts in class. I think it's so important at an academic table to understand that conversation is part of an imaginative exercise. That is, you can entertain ideas safely without adopting them as your final opinion on the matter. There was sometimes a sense of the "right answer" before thoroughly discussing different possibilities. The question of justice is central. What is lost with only mercy and not justice? This is a very old question, and not simple. Sarcasm and presuming that everyone thinks the same way ("Yay abortion!" said one person) tends to closet people who do NOT think that way.

In particular, I felt the discussion of abortion was not fair at the end of a seminar on punishment. I don't think that that topic can be discussed given how personally felt it is for people, particularly people who

have had an abortion. What if I disagree with the reading that Sethe killing her child because she doesn't want her child to have a life of slavery is analogous to a woman's right not to be enslaved by the state for 9 months as a pregnant mother? What if I think that, in the end, a reader must acknowledge the killing of Beloved as a terrible tragedy? Can I say in a room with someone who has said, "Yay abortion!" that abortion is a tragedy? What if in that room is someone who has had an abortion?

How bizarre that after weeks of hearing about human dignity and arguments that even one life is infinitely precious and even the phrase "respect for life" - how bizarre to realize that in that room someone can claim -without acknowledging any difficulty - that Roe vs. Wade is so clearly the right thing. How bizarre to hear the conversation about publicizing the death penalty with footage of the event - many were for it (I was not). Would people feel differently about publicizing an abortion?

The discussions often precluded different opinions by virtue of the tone that overlaid it. This tone and its censoring action was unrecognizable to the people using it. Even in one evening discussion when a member pointed it out - that he felt mocked when he spoke - another member with largely liberal opinions had no idea and even needed examples to illustrate this phenomenon. I found this so, so sad.

My experience of academia is that overwhelmingly it is an institution that tries to reproduce its beliefs. This is understandable - what else is education afterall? However, it's a problem to me that nearly all academics have the same leaning in politics and that nearly all people who feel that they can speak freely in class have those same politics.

It was also hard in a social way to continually monitor my opinions so that I was not too much of an outsider in the group. -Mary Sweeney

## Summarize your overall assessment of the experience and the effect you anticipate it will have on your teaching and scholarship.

My experience was very positive. A key component of my contentment with this program is that it was learning for its own sake: I completed the readings carefully and on-time because I wanted to contribute to the learning of the group. In my many years of schooling, this is the only class where I have ever completed ALL of the readings. Austin created such fertile ground for conversation that I felt deeply motivated to come prepared to listen, speak, and learn for every session.

The seminar will impact my teaching because it has changed the way I think about running a class. I appreciate how Austin took control of the discussion (at first I was skeptical of this strategy, until I realized that it worked) and called on everyone to answer an open-ended question. This style prevented people from both dominating the discussion and retreating from it. Nobody was competing for his/her voice to be heard because we all trusted that, eventually, we'd have our chance.

My scholarship is in theology and philosophy. The content of this course and the questions it posed has opened a new branch of philosophical theology for me, and has enabled me to develop the skills to utilize legal thinking and texts in my work.

# Evaluate specific aspects of the program, such as the director, visiting faculty (if any), colleagues, topics, organization, discussions, and activities.

Austin Sarat: extremely skilled at facilitating an open conversation. Considering the topics we were investigating, it would have been very easy for our discussions to devolve into either an ideological echo chamber or harmful debates. Neither of those things happened. Austin was careful to treat everyone equally. The result of this equal treatment, I believe, tampered down the natural tendency of people to 'show off' or become defensive. I appreciated how Austin limited references to specialized knowledge/texts outside the scope of the course. Austin strikes a great balance of being positive and supportive of what we say in class while at the same time pushing people to actually answer the question at hand and give charitable readings of the texts.

I thought the readings were well-chosen and the sequence was effective. My only critique of the readings is that it was a little disappointing to read longer texts (Beloved, Eichmann) and then discuss them for such a short amount of time.

I enjoyed learning from my peers in the group projects and am happy that I have a hard copy of the materials from those projects.

# Evaluate the host institution particularly with respect to hospitality, housing arrangements, the suitability of library facilities, and computer facilities.

Megan Estes: her care, advance planning, and attention to detail was so appreciated. It's obvious that the logistical success of the program is due to her professionalism and skill.

I cannot speak too much about facilities because I did not live on campus, but I never had any problems with library access, parking, online resources, etc. I appreciated having full library access.

### Do you have any suggestions for improvements?

Since the program has ended, I realize that the residential community formed on campus is a big part of the NEH experience. A part of me regrets not living on-campus and joining that community. Living on campus was not possible for me because of my family situation--I don't resent this and ultimately believe it was the best decision. My peers were still extremely inclusive. It would have, though, been helpful to know ahead of time that the residential experience is not an accidental attribute of the program. Had I known this, I would have been more deliberate about participating in community events earlier on. It might be nice to add an FAQs sheet for participants coming with their families.

It was enjoyable and generous for Austin to have 1-on-1 meetings with each of us. I wonder if these could be better framed to make the discussion a little more challenging or fruitful. For example, Austin could have people answer a few questions in writing leading up to the meeting.

I would have been nice to go around the room at the last session and have everyone offer a few words of closing--what he/she learned, will miss, appreciated about the group, etc.

It was great when Austin took us out to pizza the first week. I think it'd be even better if there were some kind of "mandated" social activity every week to promote kinship among the entire group (I'm thinking here mostly about people who didn't live in Drew having a chance to socialize). While we're all adults and were able to organize our own outings, there is something different and important about an outing that the 'people in charge' organize.

I think it would make discussions even better and more open if Austin clamped down on the tendency of many of us to talk about the "we." For example: "We hated the Morris reading." No, "we" didn't hate the Morris reading, some people did and they have erroneously chosen to speak for the group. Again, while we are adults and should be able to self-monitor these things, I think it would be a good ground-rule to restrict people from making statements like this. It was actually the only time when I felt a little offended by my peers (I don't want to exaggerate--this was a small thing and I really loved our seminar!). Presupposing what others think creates a toxic environment that encourages a subtly dominant groupthink that inevitably excludes some people. I did feel that by the end of the seminar, there were some people whose comments were often poo-pooed by other group members. To be fair, I believe that Austin is acutely aware of these group dynamics and does his best to monitor them in a spirit of positivity.

I would love to see more philosophy seminars. While there are very few secondary teachers who teach philosophy courses, it's such a valuable framework of thinking an is totally inclusive of people from all disciplines.

# Summarize your overall assessment of the experience and the effect you anticipate it will have on your teaching and scholarship.

There are so many things I will take away from this summer -- I have had a wonderful experience with NEH. Austin united our group from the beginning by saying that his main hope for us is that we will exude "generosity" during our time together. This made me think about how I would like to build classroom community when I go back to work in the fall. Austin began almost every class with a philosophical question, and this made me realize how I need to figure out a way to have more classroom discussions because they are powerful tools for engagement. The theme of the course continues to make me think critically about when I apply thin or thick forms of justice in my classroom and school. The readings and discussions make me think about how powerful a teacher's love for his

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students can be, and how sometimes it might be the only path towards changing a student's behavior and outcomes. From a more scholarly perspective, reading Supreme Court cases for the first time helped me see how arguments are formed in our legal system. I also saw how one might begin to pick apart these argument by examining their logical fallacies or sweeping assumptions. One of my main jobs is to teach students how to make persuasive arguments, so it is essential that I get more practice at this myself.

Our program director, Austin Sarat, is a charismatic and wise teacher who makes everyone part of the class discussion. His teaching style -- part participatory theater, part Socratic -- made for serious but lively debates. We tackled dark subjects (punishment, torture, the death penalty), which I had not deeply questioned until this summer. Our weekly group projects every also gave us the opportunity to incorporate our own interests into the seminar, and it facilitated our discussion of these topics during our free time. The program was very well organized thanks to Austin and Megan. The expectations were laid out clearly from the beginning and everything ran on time. This was a good model for how an effective class runs.

Austin is a very kind, honest, friendly, and very rigorous scholar. He's a modern day Socrates only more affable, probably. He always made himself available. And he always made himself available. Every topic was organized in a fashion that showed how each was connected in a sort of complex web of essential ideas related to punishment, politics, and culture. His organization and the way he delivers the ideas through questioning has inspired me to rethink my own class organization and pedagogy style.

We were given a guided tour of all the specifics that we needed to know to adequately do research. I've utilized the library facilities nearly every day (I think I downloaded over 100 articles that were available through Amherst College's online journal database). Megan has done an outstanding job at being available. I even wrote her concerning a tooth ache problem that might've progressed to something worse, and she recommended a dentist!

### Do you have any suggestions for improvements?

This is difficult because the class is excellent in every respect. I don't consider my recommendation as something that is needed because the seminar needs improvement. This is merely a suggestion, which I'm sure Austin has already considered and has sufficient reason for excluding it. I would suggest there be room in the reading schedule to explicitly learn about the current status of restorative justice as an alternative to punitive punishment. Although this topic came up during discussion, I think participants could benefit from direct readings and the dialectic that restorative justice has started in criminal law, especially because it's also considered as an alternative to punitive models of discipline in schools. Also, because Austin has combined film and literature with the readings (which I loved), I would recommend the film, "The Place Beyond the Pines" as a relevant film to watch while learning about restorative justice. The film came out a few years ago. It tracks the negative effects of criminal wrongdoing by analyzing how a son is affected by the "sins" of his father. The son faces the ultimate choice of either continuing the cycle of wrongdoing that his father started, or embracing non-punitive responses to the perpetrator such as forgiveness, mercy, and clemency.

But the most striking benefits of this seminar were not, ultimately, immediately practical. In this course, both in and out of class, we tested, questioned, considered, and celebrated. Because it is a gift to look closely at a small corner of the universe. It is a gift to be challenged by people who respect you. ## Summarize your overall assessment of the experience and the effect you anticipate it will have on your teaching and scholarship.

I loved this seminar. Every day without exception, I felt challenged, supported, and intellectually alive. From the dual perspectives of student and teacher, I found it a joy to learn from Austin Sarat. Much of what we learned in class was utterly new to us, but Austin structured each class so as to introduce heady concepts in completely manageable - and fascinating, gripping - ways. He had the gift of understanding what each student was trying to say, no matter how muddled or nascent our thoughts might have been, and he treated his students with more respect, and conducted class with more humility, than I believe I've ever seen a teacher do. Our syllabus drew unexpected and illuminating connections among texts, progressively expanding our facility with legal concepts while deepening our own ethical stances on punishment. My fellow participants were all smart as a whip, but in very different ways, and I relished the sheer variety of their contributions to our conversations over the five weeks of class. I came away with many ideas for integrating real-world questions and texts (legal, ethical) into my English literature curriculum. More importantly, I came away having remembered what it is like to be on fire in your learning, and how a masterful teacher can make that happen not just for one student, but for a whole class.

His syllabus is well-organized and consisted of everything from popular movies to Supreme Court cases. For three class days (spread throughout different weeks) we ran our seminar in three different groups, which gave us a chance to determine the course of the conversation and inject topics that were not explicitly covered in the syllabus/course. It was wonderful to be in an environment where everyone was so committed to learning and sharing ideas.

Megan, who ran the program, quickly responded to any issues or requests and made sure the people living in the dorm were comfortable.
