

## Greek 111: Final Syllabus (Oct. 28 – Dec. 14)

### Oct. 28, Fri.

In *Text* reading 5A.

In *Grammar* be able to decline οὐδεὶς (86, p. 75) and the present participle of εἰμί (87, p. 77). You are not responsible for the accents of either word.

Be able to conjugate the imperfect active (101, p. 92) and middle (102, p. 92) of παύω; as always with verbs, you are responsible for the accents (recessive, as before).

Read about augments in 104 and 105 (pp. 93-94) and “Augment and prefix” (p. 95).

Write out to hand in Exercise 5A-B 2 (p. 94) and 3 (p. 95).

### Nov. 2, Wed.

In *Text* reading 5 B (p. 56).

In *Grammar*, be able to conjugate the imperfect active (106, p. 96) and middle (107, p. 97) of ποιέω.

Be able to recite Exercises 5 A-B 4 (p. 98) and 5 A-B 6 (p. 99).

Write out to hand in Exercises 5 A-B 5 and 8 (p. 99).

### Nov. 4, Fri.

In *Grammar* be able to translate the sentences in “B/C Word Shape and Syntax” (1, p. 101) and write out the verbs to hand in.

Be able to translate the verbs in 2 (p. 101) and write out the changes in number.

→ **Quiz on conjugation of the imperfect. Know the meaning and be able to conjugate, with correct augment, the following verbs (non-contract and ε contract) in both the active and middle:**

> = “augments as”

ἀπάγω (ἀπο + ἄγω = ἀπ-άγω > \*ἀπ-ἦγον)

ἀποκτείνω (> ἀπ-έκτεινον)

ἀποφεύγω (> ἀπ-έφευγον)

ἄπτω (>\*ἦπτον; not a compound)

ἀσεβέω (>ἠσέβουν)

ἀφέλκω (ἀπο + ἔλκω = ἀφ-έλκω > \*ἀφ-ἦλκον)

ἀφικνέομαι (ἀπο + ἰκνέομαι = ἀφ-ικνουῖμαι [contracted, short ἰ])

#### Imperfect of ἀπάγω

\*Accents: Thus far you have encountered circumflex accents on verbs mostly only with contract verbs.

There is another location: The accent cannot precede the augmented syllable; that augmented syllable receives a circumflex when a single short syllable follows.

(The other un-contracted place you've seen a circumflex is in the singular imperative of one-syllable stems with long vowels: βαῖνε! παῦε!)

### Nov. 7, Mon.

In *Text* reading 5 C (pp. 58-59).

In *Grammar* familiarize yourself with the present active participles (90, pp. 82-83, and 91, pp. 83-84). Since they decline like ὄν, οὔσα, ὄν and are easy to spot, we're not going to linger over them.

Be able to conjugate the irregular past of εἶμι ("to be") (110, p. 98) and the imperfect active (106, p. 96) and middle (107, p. 96) of τιμάω.

Be able to conjugate future active and middle of παύω (112, p. 102) (just add an σ to the present forms).

### Nov. 9, Wed.

In *Text* reading 5 D (pp. 60-62).

In *Grammar* familiarize yourself with the present middle participles (92-93, pp. pp. 84-85); always -μενος, -μένη, -μενον.

Be able to conjugate the imperfect active (106, p. 96) and middle (107, p. 97) of δηλόω.

Be able to conjugate the future of εἶμι ("to be") (122, p. 106) and of εἶμι ("to go") (123, p. 106) (εἶμι is actually a present form, but always used with future meaning).

### Nov. 11, Fri.

In *Grammar* write out Test Exercise Five (p. 113).

Read 117 to 120 (pp. 104-105) and be able to recite the future of the verbs listed (i.e., διαφθείρω, μένω, νομίζω, ἀκούω, βοάω, σιωπάω, φεύγω, βαίνω, γίγνομαι, γιγνώσκω, λαμβάνω, μανθάνω, ὀράω, πάσχω).

**Be able to parse verbs in the present, imperfect, and future (i.e., give tense, number, person, voice [active or middle]).**

Write out Exercise 6 A-B 3 (p. 117).

In *Text* reading 6 B (pp. 66-67).

In *Grammar* read about the aorist of contract verbs with stems ending in -εα- and -οα- (134, p. 118) and verbs ending in λ, μ, ν, ρ (135, p. 118).

Write out to hand in Exercises 6 A-B 4 (pp. 118-19) and 6 A-B 5 (p. 119).

In *Text* reading 6 C (pp. 68-69).

In *Grammar* write out the table in Revision Exercises 4 (pp. 122-23).

Be able to conjugate the second aorist active of λαμβάνω (144, p. 124) and second aorist middle of γίγνομαι (144, p. 125). (λαμβάνω also has a middle in the aorist, ἐλάβομαι).

**Nov. 30, Wed.**

In *Text* reading 6 D (pp. 70-71).

In *Grammar* write out to hand in Exercises 6 C-D 1 and 2 (p. 126).

Write out to hand in Revision Exercises 1 and 2 (p. 130).

**Dec. 2, Fri.**

→ **Hour exam on verbs.**

Be able to conjugate the present, imperfect, and aorist of the following. Below are the present and aorist; recall that you can always form the imperfect from the present:

In *Grammar* be able to recite the forms of the present active and middle infinitive (**150 - 152**, pp. 134-35).

Write out Exercise 7A-C 1 (p. 135).

### **Dec. 12, Mon.**

In *Text* readings 7 C and D (pp. 78-80).

In *Grammar* learn how to form comparatives and superlatives (154 -155, pp. 136-37).

Be able to identify the irregular comparative and superlative forms (159, p. 137)

Be able to conjugate ἀμείνων (160, p. 138), which you already know from εὐφρων.

### **Dec. 14, Wed.**

In *Text* readings 7 E and F (pp. 81-82).

In *Grammar* write out to hand in Test Exercise Seven D-F

Be able to recite the active first aorist participle of παύω (163, pp. 142-43).

You will be responsible for translating passages from Sections Five through Seven F and test exercises up to Seven D-F (p. 150), plus the forms stipulated below. As usual, vocabulary will be supplied that has not been assigned to be learned by the end of Section Seven D-F (p. 148). The test will be about twice the scale of the hour tests, and you will have as long as you want to complete it.

1) Be able to decline the nouns (3a through 3f); you will be asked to decline the nouns given in the paradigms (i.e., νόξ, πρᾶγμα, et al., up through ἄστυ). Accents not required. The list is in 356, pp. 384-85.

2) Be able to conjugate (with accents):

be: εἶμι + ῆ(ν) (with alternative forms) + ἔσομαι (385, p. 433);

go: εἶμι (386, p. 433);

know: οἶδα (387, p. 434).

3) Be able to conjugate the present, imperfect, future, and aorist of the following verbs (i.e., you need to know the principal parts); accents required. The principal parts are listed in the comprehensive list in 389 (pp. 436-42); in some case you need to look up the compounded form (εἰσφέρω) under the un-compounded form (φέρω).

4) Be able to decline the first aorist active participles of the above verbs that have a first aorist (**163**, pp. 142-43); accents not required.

5) Be able to decline ἀμείνων (**160**, p. 138) (with alternative forms); accents not required.

6) Be able to identify the comparative and superlative forms in **159** (p. 137); e.g, for χείρων, χεῖρον be able to supply: “comparative of κακός, bad.”

7) As mentioned, four translations from the readings in Sections Five through Seven F, including Test Exercises, with parsing. You will be responsible for parsing all indicative verbs in the present, future, imperfect, and aorist, as well as present imperatives and infinitives.

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<sup>1</sup> I mark a couple of future forms you haven't encountered, as well as this particularly tricky one; but keep in mind that other future forms come from different stems entirely).
