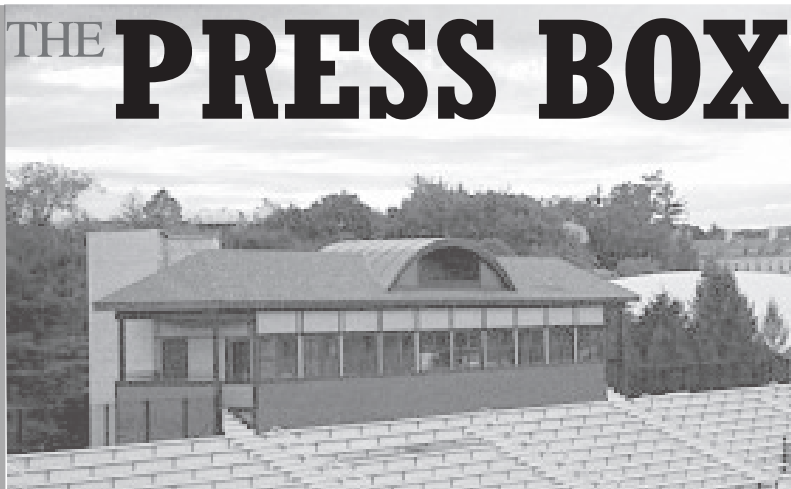

# FROM THE **PRESS BOX**

WILLIAMSTOWN, MA — Hello and welcome to Farley-Lamb Field for the 132<sup>nd</sup> gridiron version of the “The Biggest Little Game in America” between Amherst College and Williams College.

Williams leads the all-time series versus the Mammoths 71-55-5. It is the fourth most-played rivalry in NCAA football and the most played in Division III.

Last week, Amherst defeated Trinity 28-20 while the Ephs traveled to Middletown, Conn, and dropped a 35-0 decision to Little Three rival Wesleyan.

Eph head coach Mark Raymond was hired in March of 2016. He came to Williams having helped build St. Lawrence into one of the premier rising powers in the East, leading the Saints to seven wins in three consecutive seasons for the first time in nearly 40 years. Raymond is currently 4-9 at Williams.

One thing that was new to Raymond’s staff and his team this year is the introduction of a nine-game NESCAC season. 2017 will mark the first time in New England Small College Athletic Conference history that all NESCAC teams will face each other on the field.

The last time the Ephs played a 9-game season was in 1907 when they went 6-3.

Since 1985, combined gatherings of Williams and Amherst alums have been watching “The Biggest Little game in America” via a satellite feed and both schools shared the cost of production. However, in 1994, Amherst elected not to participate in the cost of production and Williams paid the entire fee. Williams won that game played in Amherst 48-14.

The 1995 game played on Weston Field was televised live on ESPN2. The game kicked off at 10:00 a.m., but the natural grass field had been subjected to unusually heavy rain that fall and

it was a quagmire. The final score was 0-0 and is the last tie game in the series.

Beginning in 1996, the game has been seen live on the New England Sports Network (NESN) as well as via satellite in the nation’s largest cities. The 2010 game was the first to be streamed on a delayed basis on the Internet worldwide. Because of NESN’s contract with DIRECTV, the game could not be streamed online until two hours after kickoff.

On November 10, 2007 Williams became the first NCAA Division III team to host ESPN’s College GameDay. Williams won 20-0.

E.J. Mills is in his 25<sup>th</sup> season on the Amherst sidelines and 21<sup>st</sup> as head coach. Mills has been a part of 148 victories for the Mammoths. He came to Amherst in 1993 and served as a defensive coordinator through the 1996 season, working with former Yale head coach Jack Siedlecki and helped the team improve its record in each of his four years as an assistant. When Siedlecki made his move to lead the Bulldogs, Mills was named the interim head coach for the 1997 season, and has been at the helm ever since.

Last week in the loss to Wesleyan, the Ephs generated just 127 yards of total offense on the day with 51 yards coming through the air. Wesleyan gained 455 yards on the day with 272 through the air.

Eph LB Jarrett Wesner was the Ephs’ top tackler on the day with 13 stops. Five of Wesner’s tackles were solos and he assisted on one tackle for a loss. LB Brandon Morris led the Wesleyan defense with eight tackles (4 solos).

Williams comes into today’s game ranked sixth in the conference with 21.5 points per game after eight games. The Ephs are fifth in rushing yards (1,171), seventh in pass yards (1636) and sixth in offensive yards per game at 350.9.

First-year quarterback Bobby Maimaron has connected on 57.9 percent (139 of 240) of his passes through the first eight games for 1617 yards, 12 touchdowns and seven interceptions. He has rushed for 269 yards, which is third on the club. Senior Connor Harris leads the Ephs in rushing yards with 332 on 63 carries and is averaging 5.3 yards per carry. He has scored two touchdowns. First-year T.J. Dozier has 297 yards on 73 carries, a 4.1 yard per carry average.

Three first-year receivers lead Williams in receptions: Frank Stola has 43 catches for 606 yards, a 14.1 yards per catch average, and six touchdowns; Justin Nelson has 28 receptions for 368 yards (13.1) and a touchdown, while senior Adam Regensburg has 21 receptions for 219 yards to date.

Defensively, Amherst is fourth in the conference with 17.8 points allowed per game, and first with 257.4 yards allowed per contest. The Mammoths are first in rushing yards allowed at 91.4 per game, and second in passing yards allowed at 166.1.

Junior linebacker Andrew Sommer leads the Mammoths in tackles with 62 (44 solo) and also has five sacks, two fumble recoveries and an interception, while Andrew Yamin is second with 45 (29 solo) along with a conference-leading 12 ½ sacks. The Mammoths lead the conference with 28 sacks, are second in fumble recoveries with nine and tied for third in interceptions with seven.

The Williams defense is third in the NESCAC in points per game, allowing 17.5 a contest. The Ephs are fourth in yards allowed at 333.1 per game, fifth in pass yards allowed at 209.1 and fourth in rushing yards allowed at 124. Williams is fifth in sacks with 21 through eight games and third in interceptions with seven.

First-year linebacker T.J. Rothman leads the Ephs with 79 tackles (39 solo) and also has a fumble recovery, two interceptions and six pass breakups to his credit. Wesner is second on the team with 65 tackles, 34 solo, and also had 3 1/2 sacks and one pass break-up to his credit.

The Amherst offense is led by quarterback Ollie Eberth, who has completed 60.4 percent (87 of 144) of his passes to date for 1348 yards, eight touchdowns and three interceptions. His favorite targets are junior Bo Berluti (36 catches) and sophomore James O’Reagan (35 receptions, 6 touchdowns). Junior tailback Jake Hickey has rushed for 628 yards on 101 carries to date, a 6.2 yards per carry average, and scored nine touchdowns.

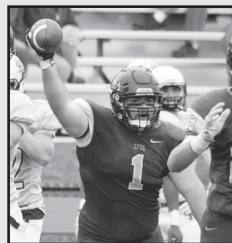

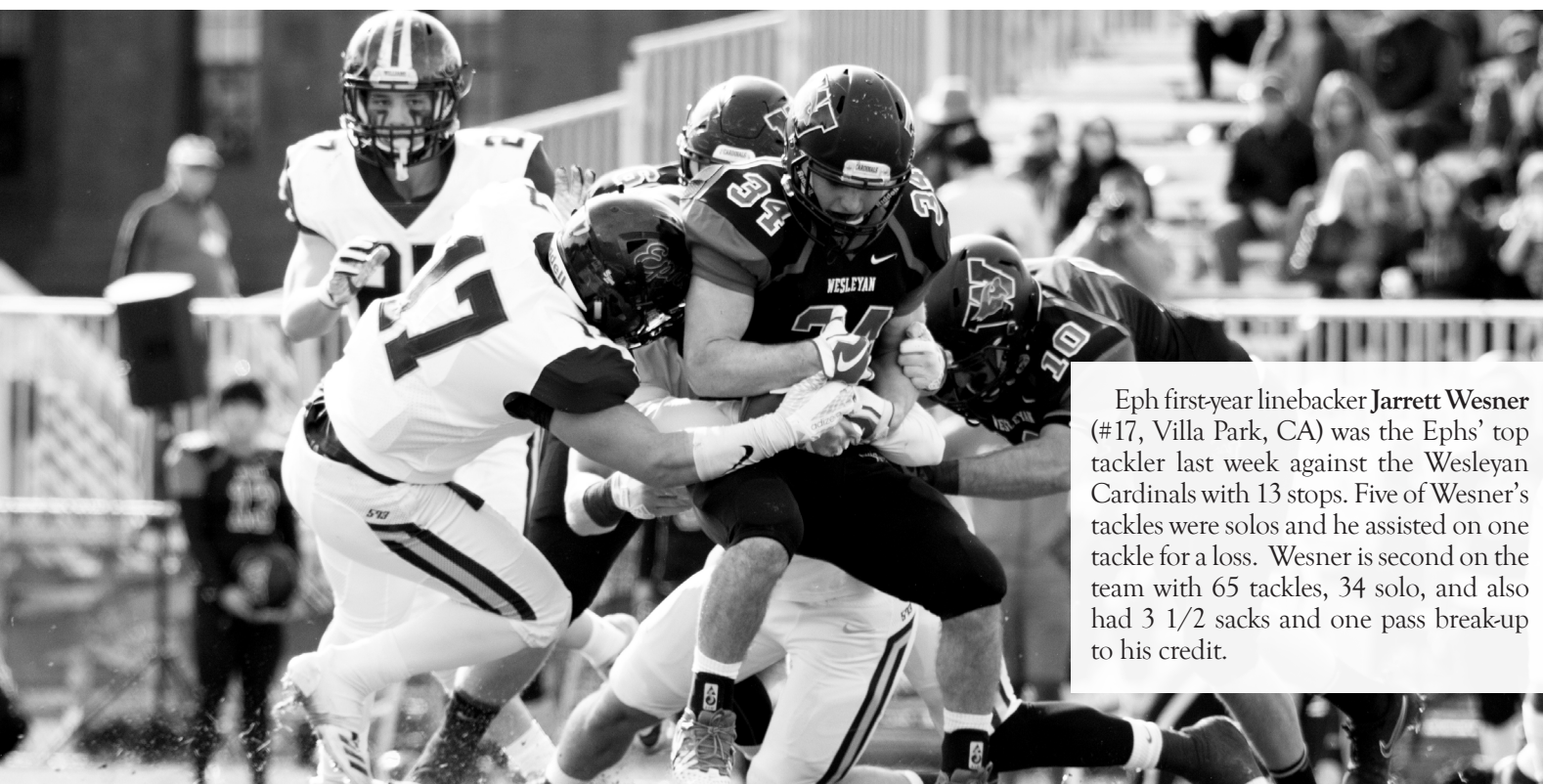

## *Focus on Improvements Over Results*

self-critical and never dreamed I'd be able to go to Williams.

Things are much different now than when Hattar showed up at the Williams campus in the fall of 2014. He was joining a team that was only three years removed from a perfect season, including a solid 19-13 record over the past four seasons. However, the program was heading in the wrong direction, with the team having just suffered its first losing season since 1985.

As is the case with many freshmen, Hattar only saw the field sparingly his first year. A year later, he became the starting nose guard. Over the course of the season, he amassed 24 tackles and his first career sack. He showed clear improvement towards the end of the season, recording six tackles in a 27-7 loss to Wesleyan and five in a 17-7 loss to Amherst.

Hattar improved his statistical output in his junior season with 28 total tackles and two sacks. He played perhaps his best game in a 38-13 loss to Trinity, in which he recorded six tackles, a sack, and a fumble recovery. But putting statistics and performance aside, Hattar's junior season came with two major changes: a new head coach and serving as captain.

Whereas a defensive lineman usually just has to focus on doing his job every play, captaincy means leading and setting a positive example for everyone on the team, offense and defense, skill positions and non-skill positions. It was a role that didn't come without challenges, especially for a non-senior.

"It is a lot of pressure to serve as captain," said Hattar. "It was definitely tough to navigate the role with guys being a year older than me. But everything you do is for your boys."

Although it would be unfair to pin last season's 0-8 record on the new coaching staff or the captain's leadership, the experience gained helped prepare for this season. In particular, Hattar highlighted head coach Mark Raymond's coaching style as a source of optimism.

"Coach Raymond has brought a new fire to

the program. Everything is more effort-based with the idea that results will follow. He's all about getting as much out of every player as possible," said Hattar.

Mirroring Coach Raymond's approach, Hattar stated the importance of focusing on improvement rather than results.

"My team goal is obviously for us to win games. But personally, I would like to see improvement every week," said Hattar. "It is not all about the stat sheet. Attitude is also important. I want to see us competing just as hard the Bowdoin week as the Amherst week."

Also an enthusiast of music and cinematography, Hattar came to Williams with the idea that he would double major in Economics and Chinese. In fact, he took Chinese classes for six years before college. But after trying out courses in a variety of subjects, Hattar switched to being an English major and Leadership Studies concentrator. His favorite class so far at Williams was called Leadership and Strategy, taught by Galen Jackson. Having taken full advantage of the wide-ranging academic opportunities at Williams, he will ultimately pursue a career in finance after graduation. 🐾

The number five holds considerable significance for senior captain Chris Hattar. The second oldest of five siblings, he has an older sister, a younger brother, and two younger sisters. Five was also the age that the English major started playing football.

"I knew I wanted to play college football when I was eight years old. My dream was ultimately to go to the [NFL], but at a certain point I started to value education," said Hattar.

A native of Poughkeepsie, N.Y., Hattar chose to follow in his father's footsteps by playing on the defensive line. And unlike many of his fellow Ephs who have played many positions, Hattar has stuck to doing the dirty work his entire career.

"Defensive line is not a glory position," said Hattar. "But it's great to just contribute in any way you can and let your boys shine."

Despite never taking any handoffs, hauling in any receptions, or throwing any touchdown passes, Hattar loved contributing to the team and making it possible for others to succeed. Although he also participated in wrestling, lacrosse, and track and field at the Trinity-Pawling School, Hattar never lost sight of his college football dream. After liking what he saw from the 6' 280 lbs. Hattar, former Williams head coach Aaron Kelton gave him a chance.

"I went to camp, worked really hard and had a good day," said Hattar. "But I'm very

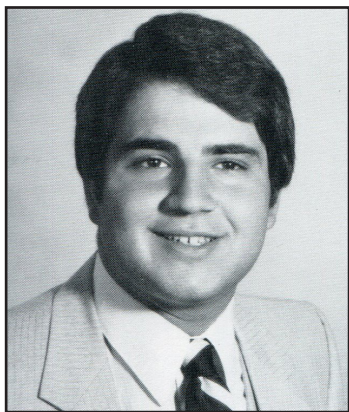

# EPH LEGEND – STEVE EPSTEIN '83

## *“I Did Play by Play on Two Eph Miracle Football Finishes 15 Years Apart” - Chapter One*



The football book looks so out of place on the lawyer's bookshelf. But there it is, next to the treatises and law review articles—*Heart Stoppers and Hail Marys, 100 of the Greatest College Football Finishes (1970-1999)* by Ted Mandell.

Huh???

I'm the lawyer and it's my bookshelf, and the reason the book is there is because this lawyer got to call the play-by-play of maybe the greatest Williams-Amherst football game ever played. Buy the book, which comes with a CD, and re-live the chaos.

I had been Sports Editor of *The Record* and was Sports Director of Williams College Radio (WCFM), working play-by-play of the football games alongside Sam Flood (now a executive producer at NBC Sports, with 26 Emmys to his name), Todd Krieg, and Peter Worcester doing stats. The game that was etched in our memories was Williams-Wesleyan 1982, when the Ephs came back to claim a 27-24 victory thanks to a miracle TD toss from junior quarterback B.J. Connolly to junior wide out (and now Grammy winning country singer-songwriter) Marcus Hummon.

There was drama off the field that day, too. I found out about it when I ran into Williams Sports Information Director Dick Quinn at a dinner honoring head coach Dick Farley during the spring of 1997. Quinn shared Farley's account of that day in 1982: After the Ephs gave up the lead in the final minutes, Farley, then the defensive coordinator, threw off his

headset in a rage and drove back to Cole Field House before the game ended. On arriving at Cole, Farley learned the Ephs had come back and won! He only believed it after he heard my recap of the miracle Hummon catch and the pandemonium as the goalposts came down.

“One of the greatest wins in the program to that time,” said Farley, “And I missed it.” Then, as an afterthought, Farley said to Quinn, “This guy is good at calling miracles—we should get him back when we need another one.”

Four months later, my office phone rang. It was Dick Quinn. Quinn explained to me that Dick Farley looked like he needed another miracle, this time against a nationally-ranked, undefeated Amherst team that led Division III in scoring defense.

Quinn asked me, now a 36-year-old finance partner in a large law firm, to don the headset one more time. I would be the guest announcer on WCFM, working alongside Williams students Jason Hehir and Matt Marvin to call the fray live on the air and via an Internet feed to alumni. Although I hadn't seen an Eph game that season and would need a lot of help spotting players and pronouncing their names, I agreed on the spot. Three things I've always loved are football, the Purple Valley, and the sound of my own voice.

Just eleven days before the big game, my father, Jesse, passed away after a long illness. Although my dad didn't attend Williams, he had a tremendous love for the college and during my broadcast days became friends with Dick Farley. Dad shared Farley's love of track and field. He would travel to MIT from our Newton home whenever Williams had a meet, just to talk track with Farley. So I spent a day trying to decide if I had the strength to trek to the Purple Valley in the wake of my father's passing. In the end, I decided Jesse would have wanted me to go. So off I went to find another miracle, and revive my dormant radio career.

I arrived at Weston Field eager to meet my broadcast partners, go over the line-ups

and get some background on the Eph team. But the broadcast booth in the press box was completely empty. No announcers and no radio equipment.

I tracked down Quinn. Occupied with pre-game requests, he stopped just long enough to explain that the Williams-Amherst soccer game, which was also being broadcast on WCFM, was running long. The broadcast equipment might not arrive before the opening kickoff. “Are we not going to cover the first quarter?” I asked. Dick assured me we'd be on the air before kickoff, then left on other business. I was left wondering how.

Within minutes, a dorm-room telephone had been installed in our broadcast position. Dick asked me to start calling the game by myself, through that phone. I'd done a Williams-Trinity hockey game from a lobby pay phone back in the day, but that was more than 15 years ago. Still, I was game.

Without a spotter or statistician, and unfamiliar with the players on either team, I forged ahead. Within a few minutes it all came back to me and I started having fun, realizing I was experiencing an amazing game. By the end of the first quarter the same Amherst defense that had previously allowed just over seven points per game in seven contests had already surrendered two Williams TDs, and the Ephs led 14-7. Equally as important, I was speaking in complete sentences, more or less, and identifying players I'd never seen before with sufficient competency. It was going well. Quinn even gave me a supportive wink. Was I good? Or, with Marvin and Hehir AWOL, was I just the only game in town?

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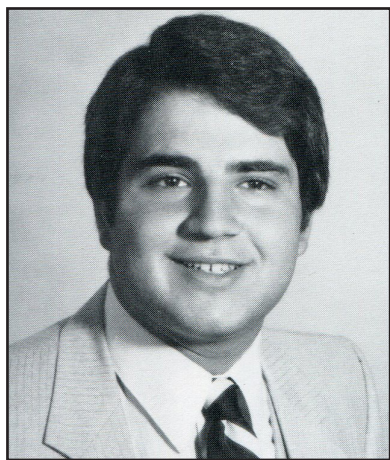

I began the WCFM/TEAMLIN broadcast of the 1997 Amherst game on a telephone line, alone, with no prior knowledge of either team and not knowing if or when Eph students Matt Marvin and Jason Hehir would arrive with the real broadcasting equipment.

They rushed into the booth minutes into the first quarter, but empty-handed. The broadcasting equipment was still in use over at the men's soccer match. So Matt and Jason headed out again—unbeknownst to me, to the tailgates below, leaving me to call the second quarter solo. Play ended with a big surprise, as Williams went into halftime with a 24-14 lead. This score was all the more surprising because through the first seven games of the season Amherst had allowed just over seven points a game.

Meanwhile, the headsets, mixer, and other equipment finally arrived. I also finally got a chance to chat with Jason and Matt. I now had two capable partners on the broadcast, not to mention real equipment. In theory my job should have become a lot easier. But the duo's tailgate-fueled exuberance suggested otherwise. As Matt put on his headset, he thanked me for my “heroic” call of the first half, while

Jason, in the background, began singing *Wind Beneath My Wings*: “Did you ever know that Steve's my hero...”

Despite their high spirits, there wasn't much to cheer about in the third quarter. Amherst scored 17 unanswered points and took the lead, 31-24. Amherst was driving again late in the quarter and when Eph safety Graham MacPhail intercepted a pass at the Williams 22-yard line. The MacPhail interception rejuvenated the Eph offense.

As the fourth quarter began, we suddenly found ourselves in overdrive up in the booth. Williams scored three consecutive TDs, taking advantage of an Amherst penalty for roughing our kicker, freshman booter Collin Vataha, and then converting an Amherst fumble on the ensuing kickoff to open a gaping 14-point lead. It seemed like celebration time with just over six minutes to go.

And then things really got interesting. The Amherst offense scored two TDs in four minutes and then took the lead on a fake kick and two-point conversion pass, putting them ahead, 46-45. Williams had 1:49 left in which to find another miracle. It was 1982 all over again.

Amherst kicked off, and a sack put the Ephs back on their own seven-yard line. A couple of plays later, looking at a fourth and seven at our own 25 with just 57 seconds remaining, Williams QB Peter Supino found receiver Matt Sigrist for 25 yards, which, combined with a 15-yard Amherst penalty for a late hit, advanced the Ephs to the Amherst 35, eventually setting up a 27-yard field goal attempt with seven seconds remaining.

It was pandemonium in the broadcast booth. Matt Marvin bellowed, “If you're not here, get down to the field, baby,

this is unbelievable. I don't care. This is the best thing I have ever seen.” Jason piped in that Dick Quinn had predicted the game would be won on a last-second Collin Vataha field goal and that, if that occurred, he (Jason, not DQ) had promised to jump naked out of the broadcast booth. The threat suddenly seemed real.

As Vataha and the Eph field goal unit trotted onto the field, Matt said, “If you're a religious person, start praying,” and then he started to plead, maybe to Vataha, maybe to the Football Gods, “Please make this! Please make this!”

I shifted back to the play-by-play, “Ball down... kick up... it's good! Williams wins on a field goal! Williams wins! Williams wins!” Complete chaos in the booth: screaming, whistling, unintelligible banter, and Matt Marvin blurting out, “This is the best thing I've ever seen in my life.” Then came his post-script, “The whole reason this is a good game is because Matt Marvin, Jason Hehir, and Steve Epstein are calling it.” I appreciated the sentiment, but wonder if the players might have had something to do with the day, too...

Williams had prevailed, 48-46. It was one of the all-time great finishes in one of the greatest college football rivalries. You don't have to take my word: we're in the book.

Thanks go to Dick Farley, Dick Quinn, Jason Hehir and the irrepressible Matt Marvin for the memories. Even 20 years later, I'm proud to have been in the booth that day.
