It may be difficult to conceive that I graduated from Amherst college with honors when one takes a look at my academic achievement during my first five semesters there. A social lion perhaps, but my GPA was cum lousy, but after Christmas in my Junior year, I returned with a determination to fix the damage. I was making progress during the spring semester when the Korean war opened a requirement for me to return to the U.S.Navy. I left with a vow to myself to return to Amherst and make an effort to graduate with honors, an ambitious challenge considering the GPA "baggage" I brought to the journey.

Just a little over a year ago I came across the attached memoriam to Professor Theodore P. Greene, Amherst '43.My first surprise was that he too was a returned veteran in 1952.
